Cynthia Fuller Begins Head of School Career During Global Pandemic

It was apparent in March 2020 that we were going to be facing a challenging time in our school and nation's history. Information was changing every day about COVID19 and the precautions that needed to be in place to keep people safe. I formally started as Head of School at the beginning of July but knew there would be no way to put everything in place in the timeframe needed to hold school safely. It was essential to begin working with numerous people and organizations well before that date in order to ensure a healthy head of school transition during a once-in-century pandemic. With the help of many, the school began planning for the challenges of the upcoming school year in April. There was continuous monitoring being conducted through the Centers for Disease Control (CDC), Bay County Health Department, Florida Health, Florida Council of Independent Schools (FCIS), National Association of Episcopal Schools (NAES), Florida Department of Education (FLDOE), Occupational Health and Safety Health Administration (OSHA), and Equal Employment Opportunity Commission (EEOC). All of

directly impacted the requirements made to welcome our students and employees back to school. To adequately address each of these areas, the HNES Communications Team was assembled in May at my request. This team consisted of Audra Resler-5th Grade Teacher, Kathy Mills-Director of Finance, Kelly Muller- Front Office, Lori Morgan-Executive Coordinator, Heather Creel-Dean of Students, and Jan Dykes-Middle School Coordinator. We also called upon our Technology Director-Lyn Morris, and Facilities Department- Andrew Jeffery/Gaila Scanlan, to help on topics in their specialized fields. Additionally, we had several consultants that helped in formulating the school's overall back-toschool plan. Amy Darnell-Hurst - Bay County Health Department, Casey Rogers - Infection Control Director at Emerald Coast Behavioral Hospital, Dr. Pamela McAllister, DO - Emergency Medicine Specialist, Walter Fuller - Architect with 40+ years of exp., Barbara Hodges -President of FCIS, Dr. Adam Gaffey- Head of School at Robert F. Munroe Day School in Tallahassee, Bill Husfelt - Bay District Schools Superintendent, and Doug Smith -Chancellor HNES Board of Trustees. It truly took an all-hands-on-deck approach in formulating the best possible plan that allowed us to open our doors safely to serve our students in person as well as continually educate students attending HNES@home. At the beginning of this school year, the school had 38 students out of 276 who were attending HNES@home due to various health circumstances. The school was able to welcome back all of our students at the beginning of April 2021. Additionally, as of April 2021, the total number of positive COVID cases on campus this year was 12, with 55 having to guarantine due to direct exposure. In

March 2021, the Bay County Health Department praised Holy Nativity Episcopal School as having the lowest percent positive rate in any other school setting in the entire county. That is a monumental feat when comparing our COVID numbers to other schools here locally. Communication with our families is vital in normal school years, but even more critical during a pandemic. Since being named Head of School, forty-five email updates have been sent, not including the school's **Happenings** email updates. Additionally, seventeen COVID email updates were sent as of April 2021. Our families are our school's lifeblood and ensuring that everyone has access to the latest information helps us work together to educate your child. In May 2021, FCIS will conduct its accreditation visit, making for another monumental milestone in our school's history. Natalie Godwin and Audra Resler have worked as our accreditation team for nearly three years. (A typical timeframe would be one year for planning and preparation.) However, due to Hurricane Michael and COVID, our visit was twice delayed. This will be Holy Nativity's 28th year as an accredited private school through the Florida Council of Independent Schools. This prestigious accreditation body sets us apart from any other school in this region of Florida, and their high standards are highly valued. We look forward to welcoming our inperson and virtual accreditation team. Our school has flourished in a time of great pain. This fact is not lost on me as I type this letter with a humble and grateful heart. We were one of the only independent schools in a small percentage to see an increase in enrollment rather than a decrease. This is truly a testament to our faculty and staff.

Team HNES Follows COVID Health & Safety Protocols for Unprecedented 2020-21

The 2020-21 HNES Operations Team of Cynthia Fuller, Heather Creel, Jan Dykes, Kathy Mills, Lori Morgan, Lyn Morris, Kelly Muller, Audra Resler, Gaila Scanlan & Andrew Jeffery met regularly during summer 2020 to stay up-to-date on the requirements and suggestions from the Center for Disease Control, the Bay County Health Department, the State of Florida Mandates, FCIS, NAES, OSHA, and EEOC to keep our students, faculty & staff as safe as possible from the COVID-19 virus.

- Families and employees will be asked to complete an Assumption of Risk form.
- Lunches will be packed at home or ordered through the school lunch program. (Drop off lunch allowed after December) Outdoor lunch Field trips will not be planned until further notice.
 Parents to remain in their vehicles during drop-off & pick-up.
 Faculty & Staff training on all health and safety requirements.
 Students with a Confirmed Case of Covid-19 may return

to school when: Symptom/fever free for 10 days from the onset of initial symptoms. Stay home when sick: The school will instruct and enforce that anyone (students or staff) who is sick (any fever, respiratory, or gastrointestinal symptoms) or believe they might have COVID-19 should stav home and separate themselves from other people in the home as

much as possible. • Household members and people who have been in close contact with someone who has had symptoms of COVID-19 should stay home for 14 days, monitor themselves for symptoms, and consult with their doctor. Limit staff to one room with one group of children. • Chapel - will take place outside. • Additional services will be scheduled to reduce gathering size. Four large commercial grade fans will be used to help with airflow. • Classes -Students will remain within a core group to avoid exposure and crosscontamination. • Special area classes will be planned strategically, taking advantage of outdoor spaces • Recess times will be scheduled to avoid crosscontamination. • 6ft between student seating will be provided or plexiglass dividers will be used. . Middle School -Students will be part of cohort groups in core subjects & special MS enrichment classes. • MS cohort classes will be assigned to a "home" classroom. Teachers will rotate to classrooms to

Dear Ones.

Hurricane Michael hit on a Wednesday; chapel day. A couple of days after the storm when it was safe for teachers to get back into the school to salvage what they could, Amy Moody sent me a picture of the white board in her room. On the board was the Bible verse for chapel on October 10th. It's from Mark's gospel, "For mortals it is impossible, but not for God; for God all things are possible." I don't know if that was a God thing or a coincidence or maybe there's no difference between the two. But what I do know is that's how many of us began our journey over the last year and a half of incredible challenges. I find myself once again being reminded of the power of that piece of scripture.

I want to commend the HNES Operations Team and their diligent work is providing a framework that will enable us to come back to our beloved

Holocaust Survivor, Irving Roth Shares His Courageous Story With Students in Grades 4 - 8

When HNES alumni parents Larry and Pam Perry offered Holy Nativity the opportunity to participate in a ZOOM visit with Holocaust Survivor Irving Roth, it was truly the chance of a lifetime for students and faculty. (Many sources declare that there are less than 400,000 survivors alive today. (www.economist.com Jan 2020

faculty member a copy of Mr. Roth's memoir *Bondi's Brother*. In addition, the Perrys made a generous contribution to the Holocaust Resource Center in the name of Holy Nativity.

Mr. Roth's story was shared by Rose Weldon - February 21, 2021 www.theislandnow.com "Born in Kosice, Czechoslovakia, on Sept. 9, 1929, Irving Roth grew up with his parents and brother Bondi in the city of Humenné in modern-day Slovakia. In a 2019 interview with Julia Swerdin of the *Horizon* newspaper at Lynbrook High School, he described his early years as being defined by playing soccer, swimming and ice skating, as well as attending public and Hebrew school. But in 1938, at age 9, Roth began noticing changes in his city following the Nazi invasion of western Czechoslovakia. At school, he told Swerdin, his class was told to chant the German national anthem every morning, and in 1939, signs appeared near his local public park stating, "no dogs, no Jews." By the end of that year, Roth wasn't allowed in public school at all, and his father, an accountant and owner of a lumber business, was forced to hand over his business to a non-Jew. Roth's parents moved their family to Hungary in 1943, and the pair left to work in Budapest and wait out the war, leaving the boys, with family members. The next spring, 14-year-old Roth, his brother, his grandparents, aunt and 10-year-old cousin were captured by the Nazis and herded onto a cattle car bound for Auschwitz.

Roth recalled that he and Bondi were made to work in gravel pits, in fields, and caring for horses while living on 400 calories a day. He added that he would supplement his food with sugar beets that were meant to feed horses.

Early in 1945, with the Russians closing in, the Roths and

thousands of their fellow prisoners were made to march from Auschwitz to the Buchenwald concentration camp in a freezing Polish winter. Not long after arriving at the overcrowded camp, Bondi and Irving were separated, with Bondi shipped to the Bergen-Belsen camp.

"My brother and I were separated there," Roth told the New York Daily News in 2011. "I never saw him again." Months later, as Roth and the other prisoners were lined up, fearing a death march, an air raid by the American forces began nearby, and the Nazi officials ordered them to their barracks. The next day, on April 11, 1945, around 3 p.m., a Black G.I. stepped into Roth's barracks and began handing out chocolate.

"I had never seen a Black person before," Roth said in the Daily News interview. "I tell people, you may not know what the Messiah looks like, but I do."

Roth and thousands of prisoners at Buchenwald had been liberated by General Patton's Third Army. The 16-year-old was 5'8" tall and weighed only 75 pounds when rescued.

Following the liberation, Roth briefly returned to Humenné and reunited with his parents, who had survived the war by hiding in Budapest.

In 1947 the three emigrated to Brooklyn, NY. Roth entered high school as an 18-year-old, where he graduated in three semesters and became captain of his school's soccer team.

In 1950, Roth was drafted into the U.S. Army during the Korean War and spent two years in radio communication school, becoming an instructor at Fort Knox, Kentucky. He attended



Polytechnic University in Brooklyn on the G.I. Bill, earned bachelor's and master's degrees in engineering.



After retiring from a career in electrical engineering in the early 1990s, he was named Director of the *Holocaust Resource Center* at Temple Judea of Manhasset. He taught students, trained teachers, and developed educational programs implemented in NY and around the world. Mr. Roth created the Adopt-A-Survivor program. Students would meet and interview a Holocaust survivor about his/her life and experiences in order to tell that survivor's story in a public venue in the year 2045, 100 years after the liberation of Auschwitz.

Mr. Roth published two books, *Bondi's Brother* and *Saved by Psalms: The Story of Irving Roth."*

Mr. Roth died on February 2, 2021. His visit with Holy Nativity students was one of his last.

Mr. Roth asked our Holy Nativity students to promise two things:

1. if you see something that is wrong, you MUST do something, 2. you must tell your own children about the



Community Mourns the Loss of Alumnus Tyler Jones - HNES c/o 2004



An Abbreviated History of Holy Nativity Episcopal School

Holy Nativity Episcopal Church opened Holy Nativity Episcopal Day School in 1959 as a program for kindergarten children. The school expanded quickly, adding 1st grade and during the 1960s, expanding up to 6th grade. The school became known locally for its mission of educating children in a Christian environment, and the enrollment flourished. In the early 1970s, programs for 3-yearolds and 4-year-olds were added, as well as an expansion of special areas. Additionally, more buildings were acquired at the church campus. The 1980s were years of perfecting the programs and increasing the enrollment of Holy Nativity, and along the way, the name was changed to our current Holy Nativity Episcopal School. Even today, however, "The Day School" continues to be used fondly by older residents of our area. In 1988, Beverly McDaniel became the Headmistress of HNES. Under her leadership, Holy Nativity aspired to become accredited by the Florida Council of Independent Schools (FCIS), which was accomplished in 1993. Momentum was growing to expand HNES through 8th grade. In 1997 the Holy Nativity School Foundation was formed, and then, in 1998, the Foundation was able to negotiate a property trade and acquired Cove Elementary School from Bay District Schools. The renovation and restoration of one of the oldest schools in Bay County took several years of daily dedicated work led by Foundation members, most of whom had fond memories of attending Cove School. In recognition of his leadership, devotion, and daily labor to this renovation project, in 2010, the main building was dedicated to and named "The Bill Lloyd Building." Due to the work of the Foundation, Holy Nativity Middle School began August 1999 with 6th and 7th graders attending school in the original 1937 north end of Cove School, which was the first section renovated. HNES thus became a twocampus school for the next ten years. with the original as Lower Campus and the new called Upper Campus. After adding 8th grade in 2000-2001, Holy Nativity held her first 8th-grade graduation in 2001. At that same time, the field behind Cove School was designated "William's Field," dedicated to the memory of a 2nd grader who was lost in a watercraft accident. As HNES expanded in the 2000s, the school's enrollment appeared stable, but a troubling trend was developing.

Between 2003 and 2008, enrollment decreased by 30 students, mostly in the pre-school population. A "Great Recession" had begun in 2007. At this same time, after 20 years devoted to the success of the school she loved, Mrs. McDaniel retired at the end of 2007-2008. With a new Head of School, the "Great Recession" became a full-blown issue in 2008. Combining with that, the first charter school opened in Bay County. Faced with a decision that some believe may have saved Holy Nativity Episcopal School, the new Head decided to combine the campuses during the summer of 2009 and move the entire school to the Upper Campus at Cove School. A flurry of activity saw some major restructuring of the facilities, and every 3K-2nd grade teacher moved to the new location in a matter of months. Beginning the school year 2009-2010. Holy Nativity Episcopal School was once more on one campus. With the "Great Recession" now in full force, in April 2010, our area suffered the tragic BP Oil Spill in the Gulf of Mexico. It was a massive environmental disaster that also impacted the income of a significant portion of our families. The first two years for a new Head of School, 2008-2009 and 2009-2010. were hard. Offered a different opportunity overseas, our Head of School resigned and Amy Moody was asked to serve as Acting Head of School during the search process. In April, the Board announced they had hired Judy Hughes as the Head of School, to begin June 1, 2011. In 3 years, enrollment had dropped from 359 during Beverly McDaniel's last year 2007-2008 to 240 students by the end of 2010-2011. Then there was good news. From 2011-2012 the enrollment increased to 252. and until the next disaster, Hurricane Michael, the 2018-2019 enrollment high point had moved up to 289 students, an increase from the low of 240 to a high of 289 in 8 years, or 20%. Our last FCIS accreditation visit was in the spring of the school year 2013-2014. To say that was a lifetime ago is not an exaggeration. Our school was proudly prepared in 2018-2019 to host our FCIS team. We loved what we had done in the 5 years since our previous evaluation, how we had grown both professionally and enrollment-wise, and we were eager to share our story. We had scheduled the entire school to be closed in November 2018, so everyone on our faculty and staff could travel to

Jacksonville for the FCIS convention. We had buses charted and rooms rented. It was the year we would be recognized at the convention as a school with 25 years of FCIS accreditation. We didn't make it to Jacksonville. On October 10, 2018, Category 5 Hurricane Michael devastated Panama City and heavily damaged Holy Nativity Episcopal School. Since that time, beginning in October 2018, our teachers and staff have restarted school 3 times in 3 locations in one year, 2018-2019; they have hurried to move out of a destroyed school and worked hard to furnish a temporary location, and then rushed to move back to our beloved campus; they did without school phones, without reliable technology nor a classroom to call their own for almost a year. Just as it was looking like "normal" would happen, we entered March 2020. Like those in schools all over the world, in a matter of days—our teachers and staff were called back from a desperately needed Spring Break-together, everyone at Holy Nativity had to learn a new way to teach...in 5 days...with inadequate supplies...plus how to survive this deadly pandemic. And the 9 -year Head of School, Judy Hughes, who had already postponed her 2019 retirement due to the destruction and demands of hurricane recovery, retired June 30, 2020. With an entire school to "invent" and lead, the new Head of School, Cynthia Fuller, faced a task many would have described as impossible. But she has strength beyond understanding and has reinvented every single aspect that needed to be addressed so that our students could attend school safely in person for 2020-2021 while also protecting the well-being of every individual employed at HNES. What a first year to remember. It is 2021. We know what is important. and we know it is not material things. We know we are each stronger than we ever imagined we could be. We know that we love Holy Nativity and treasure the indescribable closeness we developed during Hurricane recovery. We know that when we were in need. we were showered with overwhelming love and donations that made it all possible. We know when COVID disrupted our lives, we could count on each other. We know we will never doubt that God is there every step of the way.

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
