

"The STREAM is the Dream!" 2023 Kicks Off with Largest Capital Campaign in School History

In September, Holy Nativity Episcopal School kicked off an ambitious capital campaign to raise funds for a STREAM (Science, Technology, Robotics, Engineering, Arts, & Mathematics) Building. The goal is to raise \$2,000,000 to construct a state-of-the-art Science Lab on the historic Cove School campus. The STREAM Building will provide a facility for experiments involving physics and chemistry, access to equipment such as Smart Tables and 3D printers, space for robot building & coding, opportunities for innovation & invention presentations. a platform for design and creation in fine arts and performing arts, and space for problem solving, and in-person mathematics competitions. The Building will be constructed at the south end of the main schoolhouse and is expected to be completed in the 2026-27 school year. (See page 5 for list of donors.)

"Who loves Holy Nativity?" Carolyn Cramer asked at a special chapel service on November 29th, *"Well there are two people who love it a whole lot more.* Linda & Tom Weller. And I want to name the new building for them as a thank you and as a permanent reminder of their love."

Mrs. Cramer's \$300,000 contribution moved the HNES campaign total to \$778,000 on that great November day.

Mrs. Cramer's gift joins generous top donations of \$100,000 from the San Juan Family of Dottie & Ed San Juan and Mary Kathryn, and Edward San Juan, a gift of \$150,000 from the Charles A. Whitehead Foundation and Lynn & Greg Brudnicki, and an ANONYMOUS gift of \$150,000 received at Christmas time.

About the Wellers

Linda & Tom Weller have had an incredible impact on Holy Nativity for the past 80 years, but Mr. Weller's journey with the school began when he was just a young boy. In 1941, he started 1st grade at Cove





School. From here he went on to attend Bay High School and received his degree from the University of Florida. After joining the United States Navy, he graduated from the University of Michigan, attended seminary, and became a priest in the Episcopal Church. Along the way, he married his hometown sweetheart Linda Peters.

During his time away, Cove School, was eventually closed (1988), in need of substantial repairs, and was scheduled for demolition. However, at this same time, Holy Nativity Episcopal School was thriving in our Cove neighborhood and was in need of more space to house their growing population In 1998, Father Tom along with Dr. Bill Lloyd, and other members of the Holy Nativity Foundation, worked to restore the historic Cove School and made it possible for Holy Nativity Episcopal School to move into the much larger facility. Linda, Tom's wife, was a firm supporter of the work being accomplished, and her mother, Lucile Peters Graham, established the first charitable annuity trust fund in the amount of \$700,000. This money helped

cover the construction and mortgage loans accumulated during the reconstruction of the school building. Father Tom's time working with HNES wasn't over just yet. From 2004-2007, he served as the school chaplain and middle school religion teacher. He taught using two main rules, "Love God and love your neighbor." In 2014, the Board of Trustees decided to honor Linda and Tom by creating the annual "Weller Scholar." This award recognizes one eighth grader who exemplifies outstanding character, high academic progress, and a strong devotion to the mission of our school. When past, present, and future families of Holy Nativity read the names "Linda and Tom Weller," which will so proudly be displayed on the entrance of the STREAM Building, they will forever be reminded of the Wellers' dedication to and love of our school. As Father Tom once said, "I pray that this holy place will always be filled with joy, fun and competition, love, healthy children, and in your life and Time, as in my life and Time - happy memories."



What is the Holy Nativity School Foundation?

In 1998, there were plans to demolish the historic 61-year old Cove Elementary School. The building had closed as a "school" in 1988 and had been used as the "Bay District Schools Media Center." Several community members and friends of Holy Nativity combined forces to ensure that the schoolhouse would not be torn down and that it could be used as a school to increase growth opportunities for Holy Nativity.

It was April 8, 1998, when the Bay District School Board approved the legendary "property swap" that transferred Cove Elementary School into the hands of the Holy Nativity School Foundation.

Measured at 25,158 square feet on 4 acres of land, the property was valued at \$175,000.


The condition of the main building was described by Tom Weller at the time as being in "desperate but promising" condition. Due to limitations on Bay District Schools to sell to a private school, Carolyn Cramer & Mable Smith fortunately owned a piece of property adjacent to Bay High School and suggested a "trade" for the Cove School property.

Tom Weller wrote, "The Foundation then began the restoration of the buildings and grounds. For example: Floors had been covered in glued-down carpet, the original 14-foot ceilings had been concealed by dropped ceiling tiles, there was no A/C, no heat, the windows were boarded up and painted over in many places, all light fixtures had to be rewired and replaced. And that was just the beginning..." BayCo

Construction Company owned by Mary Sittman, DAILY supervisor Bill Lloyd, "worker" Father Tom Weller, engineer Rayford Lloyd and a tireless construction crew worked on the project every day for two years to restore the campus to a truly beautiful campus." Foundation member Linda Peters Weller & her mother Lucile Peters Graham set up an extra-ordinary \$700.000 Charitable Trust designed to provide

the annual payment of \$58,000 to pay off the \$500,000 construction loan and mortgage which, at the beginning, was held by the contractor. Our Foundation then wrote an official lease of the school to the Episcopal Diocese of the Central Gulf Coast for 99 years.

2023 was the 25th anniversary of our foundation. TWENTY FIVE YEARS. We are so grateful for our Foundation team who continues to be the guardians of our school – her growth, her appearance, her stability.



If a teacher needed something for her classroom the first person to check with was Mrs. Allen. When I first started, we made our lists for needed classroom supplies for the new school year and we tried to prioritize the list by what was "a need" and what was "a want" item. We knew Mrs. Allen would fill the "needs" first and add some of the "wants" if possible. Mrs. Allen as Lead Teacher was an excellent steward of school resources.

Mrs. Allen taught third grade for most of her years at HNES. She also taught kindergarten and was librarian. Generations of students at HNES were blessed with the extraordinary experience of being in Mrs. Allen's wellrounded learning atmosphere. She not only helped her students achieve their highest level of academic success, she also instilled many of the spiritual and social values which would help form their life-long values. It was not only the students who learned from Mrs. Allen's vast life experiences, teachers and parents learned many important lessons. I know that as a new teacher at HNES, I learned how to be a better teacher and a better team player just from knowing Dorothy Allen and having her as a mentor."

From Mrs. Allen's obituary (Kent Forest Lawn Tributes) Dorothy Dodd Allen passed away on January 1, 2024. She was a resident of Lynn Haven, Florida. 
Robo-Bolts Repeat Winning Ways in 2024




